ADJECTIVES

Adjectives describe persons, things or animals. They have **no** "ly".

- <u>Paula</u> is beautiful.
- <u>My computer</u> is new.
- <u>Dogs</u> are clever.
Paula is <u>a</u> beautiful <u>girl</u>.
I have <u>a</u> new <u>computer</u>.
Dogs are clever <u>animals</u>.

ADVERBS OF MANNER

Adverbs of Manner describe <u>actions</u>; they say **how** something is done. They end **with "ly".**

Alicia sings beautifully.
The wind blows strongly.
(She sings in a beautiful way/manner.)
(It blows in a strong way/manner.)

ADVERBS OF DEGREE

Adverbs of Degree describe (as opposed to Adverbs of Manner) no actions, but another adjective or adverb. They are used to emphasize or weaken a statement. They end with "ly".

Emphasis:

- Linda is *absolutely* wonderful. (How wonderful is she? \rightarrow Absolutely (=very)

wonderful.)

- We ran really quickly. (How quickly did we run? \rightarrow Really (=very) quickly.)

Weakening:

- The book is hardly interesting. (How interesting is it? \rightarrow Hardly (=**not** very)

interesting.)
